# CARING FOR THOSE WHO HAVE LOST EVERYTHING

**EARLY IN NOVEMBER, HURRICANE ETA SWEPT THROUGH HONDURAS, DESTROYING CROPS AND DEVASTATING THE LAND.** Two weeks later,
Hurricane Iota finished the job by destroying their homes. Now they are left with nothing. These natural disasters, combined with COVID-19 illnesses, mean that our friends in Honduras need our help now more than ever.

From March 15 to August 28, COVID-19 shut the country of Honduras. There were no government bailouts for small companies or unemployment checks for those who lost their jobs, creating extreme hardship for millions of families who had their livelihoods suddenly taken from them.

The population of Honduras is 9.5 million, of which 6.9 million are expected to fall into extreme poverty. With COVID-19 raging, it is necessary for families to stay together and not be herded into one big space without provisions. In response to these epic disasters in Honduras, CAMO is providing 300-500 family unit temporary shelters, each 10'x 14' and including a mattress. More than 210,000 sq. ft. of a PVC coated polyester material donated by Seaman Corporation will be shipped to Honduras for the construction of these units. CAMO will also provide families with both food and medicine, enough to last a family of six for one month, as well as basic survival buckets that include two sheets, two towels, two bath towels, two combs, a reusable set of plastic dishware, and one frying pan with a spatula. Shipments of provisions will start the third week of January.

CAMO will be supporting the community of El Progreso, Yoro, located in the North of Honduras, one of the areas most damaged by the hurricanes: 58,891 families were affected, or more than 294,755 people, and 3,600 houses were destroyed. To help this community, 92 temporary shelters have been opened, but many of these are overcrowded and unsanitary.

Meanwhile, in the western part of Honduras, CAMO has been providing hygiene products and PPE such as masks to protect people in shelters and reduce the spread of COVID-19.
