CAMO'S LITERACY PROGRAM



In Honduras, there is tremendous need in the education system. Children living in poor and isolated communities lack access to technology, so their only way to learn is through textbooks—but the government does not provide any books for children or teachers.


CAMO's education program team in Honduras has now distributed 1,100 new donated textbooks for Spanish, Math, Social Studies, and Science for third- and fourth-grade students attending the 13 rural schools supported by our literacy program. Last year, we provided textbooks for the first and second grades. Now, we need \$22,000 in order to purchase textbooks for the fifth and sixth grade. We would like to make this purchase ASAP, pending funding.



Special thanks to JC & Mary Tabet, who have provided funding for remodeling the Girls Orphanage across the street from CAMO Honduras. The kitchen and laundry areas are now under renovation so that the girls can be trained in culinary food preparation as they grow into young adults. Now that plans have been approved, construction has begun!

HOPE IS ON ITS WAY

WORKING HAND-IN-HAND, CAMO USA AND CAMO HONDURAS ARE PREPARING BUILDING SITES, CLEANING RUBBLE, AND STAGING SUPPLIES TO BE SURE WE ARE READY FOR THE HURRICANE RELIEF CONTAINER DISPATCHED JANUARY 21,2021. Our staff in Honduras has already bought cement, wood, and iron for the construction of hurricane shelters, and work will begin as soon as the container arrives.

Working with the cities' leadership to identify the families in the most need, Honduras Director Jose Bautista has selected 618 families who will receive temporary unit shelters, mattresses, food, and basic survival items.

CAMO USA donors, in response to these epic disasters, have provided us with relief items: our Hurricane container includes materials donated by Seaman Corporation (\$52,000), screws and tools from Gerber Lumber (\$10,000) and material welding equipment from Weldmaster (\$18,500). The container also includes three hundred mattresses purchased with donated funds. The container is scheduled to land at the Honduran port on March 14th and will be at the worksite by March 19th.

Our staff in Honduras has been relocated to the works sites to prepare the cement pads and footers for the shelters. Two more containers of relief supplies have been dispatched over the last two months as well.

We have now collected over 600 buckets for our bucket of care campaign—but we still need 400 more to reach our goal of 1,000 buckets! These buckets will make an enormous difference: 618 families, currently homeless in the wake of the hurricane, will have food for a full month, as well as medicine, survival supplies, and a safe and sanitary place to cook and lay their heads. These 618 families represent 3,700 people whose suffering will be eased and whose hope for a brighter future will be restored.

Meanwhile, our programs in Honduras continue to operate, with health services being provided daily—all thanks to you and your heart of service. We thank each one of you.
