THE PEOPLE WE SERVE



MEDICAL SERVICES

From May 2024 to April 2025, CAMO—alongside its volunteers and partners—provided 217,767 medical services to individuals in need across Honduras. Through 151 brigades, including medical, dental, general medicine with EKG, nutrition, women’s care, ophthalmology, otorhinolaryngology, and mammography brigades, 12,464 patients received comprehensive care and health education.

CAMO expanded specialty services in pediatric cardiology, plastic surgery, gynecology, general medicine, neurosurgery, neurology, and psychology, ensuring broader access to essential care.

Our surgical programs—including plastic surgery, neurosurgery, gastroenterology, and ophthalmology—treated 6,177 patients, restoring health and hope throughout the region.

WOMEN’S HEALTH PROGRAMS

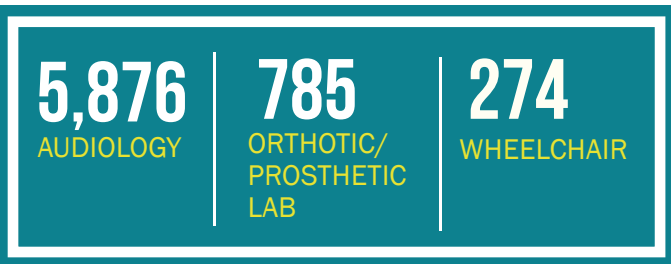
This year, CAMO’s women’s health initiatives served 5,056 patients through expanded services and strategic partnerships. With support from local institutions and municipalities, six special brigades reached women in both urban and rural areas, providing care in gynecology, cytology, mammography, and pelvic and obstetric ultrasound.

A total of 618 cervical cancer-related services were delivered—139 more than the previous year—reflecting the growing impact of CAMO’s prevention and education efforts that promote early diagnosis and improved treatment. The mammography program was strengthened through partnerships with the Municipal Women’s Offices of 20 municipalities across Copán, Ocotepeque, and Lempira, and with six institutions, including SEMUJER, which donated 300 mammograms for low-income women.

CAMO also trained general practitioners in pelvic and obstetric ultrasound, who now provide essential diagnostic services at the public health center in Santa Rosa de Copán, further enhancing women’s access to quality care.

SERVICES FOR DISABILITIES

Services Provided:



Through the ongoing partnership with the FAKS Foundation, 21 children received customized prosthetic and orthotic devices, opening new opportunities for mobility and inclusion.

A CAMO technician completed a postgraduate degree in Orthotics, Prosthetics, and Assistive Devices at Healthcare Digital School, further strengthening CAMO’s technical expertise.



Educational outreach was also expanded, with training sessions for university students on amputee care and proper patient positioning.

Thanks to the support of Social Investment (INSSA), thousands received audiometry services, reinforcing CAMO’s mission to empower people with disabilities through care, education, and innovation.

MEDICAL SERVICES

This year, CAMO strengthened its general medical services through specialized brigades, new equipment, and expanded care programs, providing essential healthcare across Honduras. In February 2025, CAMO launched the Pediatric Neurology Program, serving 137 children—the only service of its kind available to low-income families in western Honduras. The Dental Program reached 5,647 patients through both clinic and mobile teams. With 62 mobile brigades, supported by new portable dental equipment and four mobile modules, care extended to underserved communities. Eight social-service dentists also gained hands-on experience while serving the public. CAMO conducted 26 nutrition brigades, evaluating patients and providing supplements to combat malnutrition. In partnership with Harvest Call, 233 families in Ocotepeque and Copán received 1,110 food buckets, improving nutrition for vulnerable households.

PLASTIC SURGERY

This year, CAMO's surgical programs provided 4,589 treatments, expanding access to complex, life-changing procedures for patients across Honduras. The Gastroenterology Program—one of the most needed specialties for low-income patients—provided 1,588 consultations, including 1,258 procedures such as endoscopies, colonoscopies, gastrostomies, and esophageal dilations, representing 79% of total visits.

In Ophthalmology, 477 surgeries were completed, including cataract, glaucoma, and corneal transplant procedures through collaboration with the Robles Eye Center, the University of San Francisco, and specialists from Chicago. These partnerships restored vision and hope to patients who otherwise lacked access to advanced eye care.

During CAMO's international medical brigade, a team from the Holland Eye Clinic in Michigan performed 103 cataract surgeries, joining Honduran specialists to expand access to vital surgical care. The Neurosurgery and Maxillofacial programs collaborated on craniofacial surgeries, while Plastic Surgery successfully treated 23 children with cleft lip and palate, transforming lives through reconstructive care.

CAMO's support programs ensure that medical outreach, infrastructure, and equipment maintenance continue to provide reliable care for the most vulnerable populations in Honduras.

Through 151 brigades, CAMO reached thousands of low-income individuals in remote communities, offering medical-dental, general medicine with EKG, nutrition, women's care, ophthalmology, otorhinolaryngology, and mammography services.

The maintenance team completed critical repairs and upgrades at the Public Health Center, improving roofing, lighting, and plumbing systems.

The health center that CAMO built for the public health system houses 22 specialized clinics and serves 180–700 patients daily. The Domestic Violence Shelter also received interior improvements, creating a safer and more welcoming space for women and children seeking refuge. The biomedical engineering team completed 608 work orders, performing preventive and corrective maintenance on medical equipment—ensuring functionality, optimizing resources, and saving lives across western Honduras.





EDUCATION IS KEY



EDUCATION AND TRAINING

This year, CAMO empowered 3,034 people through healthcare training, primary education, and university partnerships—strengthening knowledge that saves lives and builds brighter futures.

CAMO's American Heart Association (AHA) -accredited Training Center provided 1,393 certifications in life-saving courses, including Basic, Advanced, and Pediatric Life Support (BLS, ACLS, PALS).

The center successfully completed its AHA recertification, ensuring that Honduran healthcare professionals receive internationally recognized CPR and emergency care training.

The third edition of our Nursing Protocol Manual is currently in progress. This new edition will include online training courses and instructional videos, incorporating the application of scientific principles to improve and standardize the quality of care across healthcare facilities in Honduras.

PRIMARY EDUCATION



Through partnerships with local donors and organizations, CAMO supported 16 rural schools, benefiting 1,641 children with textbooks, teacher training, and health screenings.

Seventeen school brigades provided vision, hearing, nutrition, and dental evaluations, identifying and referring 126 children for specialized care.

Thanks to support from the SG Foundation, Danilo's Cares, Pasitos on a Journey, and others, 1,500 school kits and 1,000 backpacks were distributed.

CAMO also hosted its annual Reading Speed and Comprehension Contest, involving 50 students from 17 schools, highlighting measurable progress in literacy.

CONTRACTS WITH UNIVERSITIES

CAMO continues advancing medical education by supporting the creation of Honduras' first university respiratory therapy program in partnership with UNAH and UNITEC.

With curriculum guidance and training from American volunteers, future instructors receive both classroom and hands-on ICU, NICU, and pediatric clinical experience—laying the foundation for a sustainable professional training model in respiratory therapy.

We continue the challenging task of establishing Respiratory Therapy as a recognized profession in Honduras, within a healthcare system that remains highly underdeveloped and often hindered by a corrupt, mafia-style model of management.

CAMO's community programs—ranging from the Trade School and Community Center & Gym to the Daycare Facility and Domestic Violence Shelter—offer education, vocational training, child care, and protection for women and families in crisis. At the same time, investments in the Hospital de Occidente and the Public Health Center continue to strengthen essential health infrastructure, ensuring access to quality care for tens of thousands each year.

Each project reflects CAMO's enduring commitment to dignity, empowerment, and lasting change—laying the foundation for a more just and hopeful future for all.

TRADE SCHOOL



With an investment of \$100,000 funded through generous donors and in partnership with seven institutions and ten municipalities, CAMO completed the second phase of the Trade School expansion this year. The school directly benefited more than 2,010 students, equipping them with practical skills that improve their livelihoods, increase income potential, and foster entrepreneurship. A newly constructed training area now supports cardiopulmonary resuscitation (CPR) education—linking vocational training with lifesaving medical skills.

The Trade School continues to be a cornerstone of CAMO's community development efforts—empowering individuals with the tools to achieve independence, stability, and hope for a better future.

WOMEN'S SHELTER



CAMO's Domestic Violence Shelter offers a safe haven and comprehensive 24/7 care for women and girls escaping gender-based violence. Services include housing, food, security, healthcare, psychological support, and education for residents and their children—all free of charge.

This fiscal year the shelter provided protection and recovery services to 155 women, children, and girls referred by SENAF (Honduran Secretary of State for Children, Adolescents, and Family). Built by CAMO in 2010 with 95% of funding from CAMO USA, and the balance from the National Congress, the municipality, and the local community, the shelter remains a vital refuge in western Honduras—one of the few of its kind in Central America. In a country where one in two women over age 15 experiences violence and nine out of ten cases go unreported, this program stands as a powerful testament to CAMO's commitment to protection, dignity, and hope for those most in need.

COMMUNITY PARTNERSHIP

COMMUNITY CENTER & GYM



The Community Center & Gym in Santa Rosa de Copán provides a safe and healthy space for over 600 children, youth, and families each day, fostering wellness, teamwork, and community engagement. This year, CAMO strengthened the facility with donations of sports and exercise equipment, supported by Progressive Insurance Company, which equipped the gym's cardiovascular area with treadmills, an elliptical, a hip abduction machine, an air bike, and other essential fitness units. Volunteer coaches led an intensive sports camp for 40 children, focusing on basketball and other disciplines, concluding with the donation of balls, hoops, and equipment to sustain ongoing activities.

During the CAMO Run fundraising event, chess and table tennis tournaments engaged around 50 young participants, offering competition experience and reinforcing the value of discipline, teamwork, and healthy living. Through these initiatives, CAMO continues to promote physical health, personal growth, and community connection, making the gym a vital hub of empowerment and positive change.

DAYCARE FACILITY

For over 20 years, CAMO has supported the Santa Rosa de Copán Daycare, providing medical and nutritional care, education, and essential resources for approximately 60 children each year—the sons and daughters of working parents who rely on this center for safe, daily care. Through 12 monthly nutrition brigades, CAMO nutritionists evaluated every child, ensuring early detection and treatment of health issues. Regular medical checkups further safeguarded their overall well-being.

For 19 consecutive years, CAMO has also funded the center's formal education program, employing a dedicated teacher who provides instruction and guidance to all students.

In addition, donations of toys and educational materials fostered creativity, play, and emotional growth—creating a nurturing environment where children can learn, thrive, and dream.



HEALTH CENTERS AND HOSPITALS



CAMO continues to strengthen public healthcare in western Honduras through strategic support to the Hospital de Occidente and the Public Health Center, ensuring improved quality of care for thousands of patients each year.

In 2024, the Hospital de Occidente recorded 20,167 discharges, 23,676 outpatient consultations,

and 39,806 emergency visits—figures that represent lives saved and families restored.

This fiscal year, CAMO donated medical supplies and equipment valued at \$223,391.76, including incubators, hospital beds, non-invasive ventilation systems, and neonatal resuscitation devices, directly improving patient outcomes in critical and neonatal care.

CAMO also strengthened the Emergency Department, providing infrastructure improvements, equipment, and professional training. Specialists in adult and pediatric emergency medicine offered hands-on instruction in triage, trauma management, and emergency ultrasound, optimizing care flow and saving lives in critical situations.

Through these efforts, CAMO reinforces its mission to elevate healthcare standards, ensuring that every patient receives timely, dignified, and high-quality care.

CAMO'S CAPITAL CAMPAIGN

Building Tomorrow: Sustainable Health and Education for Honduras - An Urgent Call to Expand Quality services



Phase I currently

The Building Tomorrow campaign represents a pivotal step in strengthening healthcare infrastructure, addressing the growing needs of the Honduran population, and ensuring a healthier future for those who rely on CAMO's vital services.

The need for expansion is clear. CAMO's current facilities are operating at full capacity—managing the shipment and distribution of medical equipment and supplies while serving an ever-increasing number of patients.

To meet this demand, we began construction on a new Warehouse and Distribution Center in the industrial zone of Santa Rosa de Copán, on a one-acre site generously donated last fiscal year.

In March 2025, excavation work began, removing 14.3 cubic acres of material—over 1,500 truckloads—marking the beginning of the first phase of development.

This project, designed in three phases and estimated at \$2.8 million, will expand clinical capacity fivefold, reduce patient wait times, and create new spaces for education and professional training.

To date, \$1.1 million in funding and in-kind contributions have been secured thanks to the generosity of donors in Honduras and the United States, along with strong support from the local government and community, which have waived permit fees, donated materials, and provided logistical assistance.

We remain deeply grateful to all who have joined this effort—and we continue to seek the remaining funds to make this transformative vision a reality for Honduras.

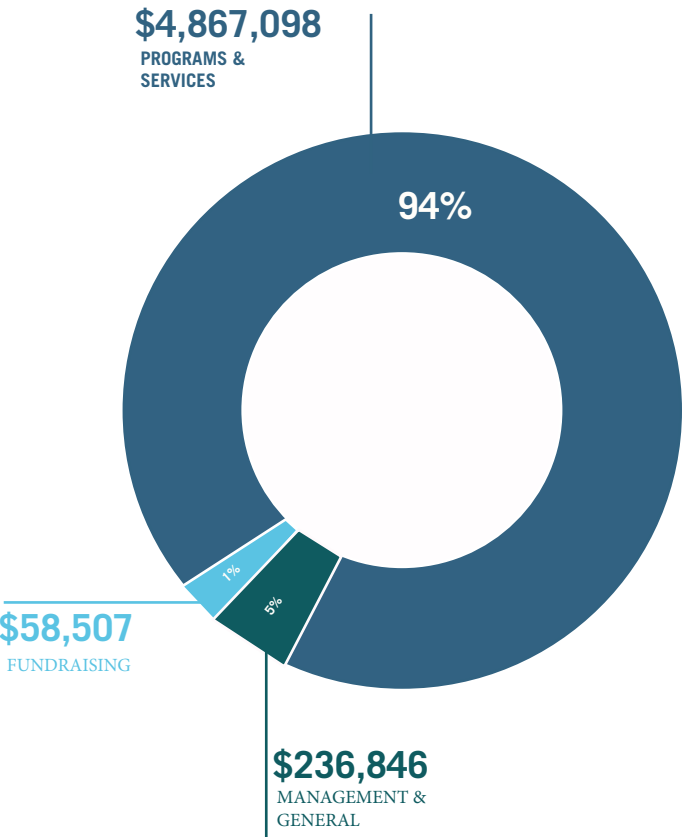

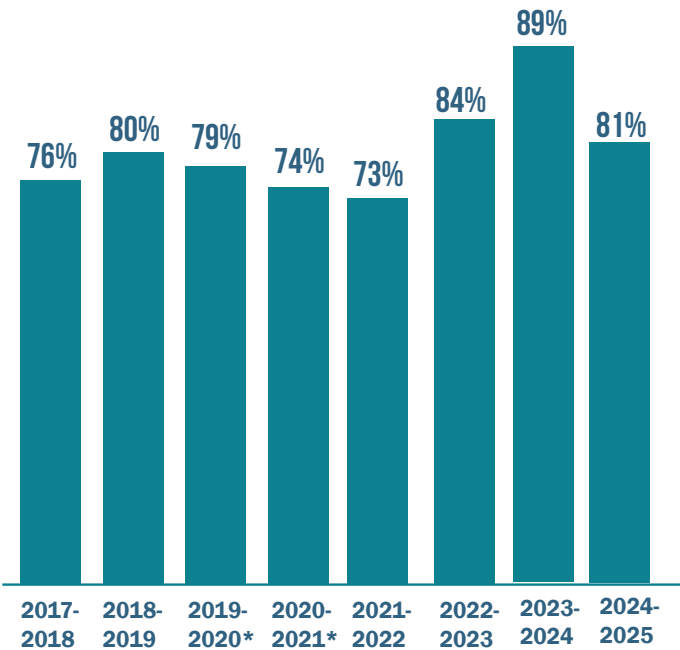
ANNUAL OPERATING EXPENSES
